Battle Against Hunger

It's no secret that Fordson and Dearborn High are rivals. Both schools are the epitome of what a rivalry should be all about. However, recently, both schools decided to put this infamous rivalry towards a good cause. The Battle Against Hunger competition was issued to both schools by School Life and they were eager to compete. In the first annual Battle Against Hunger competition, a canned food drive to combat the hunger in our community, all proceeds went towards Gleaners Community Food Bank to help the less fortunate in our community. So, throughout the week of October 12, both schools had students at their entrances collecting donations from the students and also collecting at the highly anticipated Fordson vs. Dearborn football game. The first three days Fordson took the lead with 1,235 cans and Dearborn came in with a total of 560 cans. Thursday, Dearborn stepped it up with 2,347 cans and this time it was Fordson falling behind with 1,629 cans. On the last day of the competition,



Fordson finished the school day with 7,332 cans and Dearborn finished their school day with 8,855 cans, but it wasn't over yet. At the Fordson vs. Dearborn football game, Fordson came out on top with 23,135 cans and Dearborn ended with 17,363 cans. Both schools combined efforts totaled 40,498 cans for Gleaners. In short, Fordson won the first annual Battle Against Hunger Food Drive and also won the game against Dearborn. Good job Tractors!

The war torn country has lost its educational system due to the killings of the well-educated, including teachers, by the government itself in an attempt to control its citizens. As a result there are very few schools left. This year's members have set a goal of \$20,000 to raise over the course of this year. Ambitious? Yes. Impossible? Not if we all join in and help make a difference. One last thing, the driven members of FCOPS have begun to attempt is to create a Student Union throughout the district in hopes that our voices can be heard and we are allowed to speak about what we feel isn't working for the Dearborn Public Schools. This political science club isn't centered on learning politics; it's about taking a stand, and working hands-on to improve the lives of everyone in and outside of our community.
