- 1. Be punctual
- 2. Avoid side conversations
- 3. Silence your phones
- 4. Concerns must be voiced in a way that is mindful of everyone's right to privacy (please do not mention specific names of any community members)
- 5. Discussion will be solution focused and not a platform for unconstructive negative venting
- 6. Coffee with the Principal should reflect our commitment to provide solutions for the success of all our students and not as a personal discussion concerning one student in particular

Our next meeting will be held on March 4^{th} at 8:30. I look forward to dialoguing with you all as we continue our journey in establishing a culture of excellence at Lowrey.

In addition to these meetings, should you have personal concerns or issues of a more delicate nature, I encourage you to email me, call the office to speak with me, or set up a meeting with my secretary to meet with me individually.

I would like to remind and encourage you to attend our "Annual Parent Walk Through" on March 10th at 8:30 am. Do not miss this opportunity to come in and get a snapshot of your child's daily routine at Lowrey School. DismissalTime:

Lately, we have noticed that many of our parents are starting to arrive to school before the designated release times (2:55 for Middle School, 3:00 for Elementary) to pick up their children. Furthermore, when elementary parents are in the hallway before the end of the school day, it becomes very difficult for the teachers to keep students focused. Students become distracted when they see parents in the hallways. Teachers are instructed to walk all students outside at dismissal time. We would like all parents to wait either in their cars or outside their child's exit door.

BusRiders:

If your children ride the bus, they must report directly to the bus at dismissal time. This will ensure that the bus is departing the school and dropping off students at home in a timely manner.

Please make sure your children are appropriate dressed while they are waiting for the bus in the morning.

Appropriate Dress

Students must have the appropriate clothing when they come to school. A warm jacket, pants, boots, gloves, and a scarf are all important so that your child can enjoy himself/herself safely at and around the school. We're also noticing that some students repeatedly leave their jackets behind. We will continue to remind them. Please support us by having a conversation with your child about wearing the appropriate clothing to school and using their jackets and gloves while at recess. Students will be required to go out for recess daily if the weather permits.

Overall Behavior

As we get into the holiday season, the students will be experiencing some time away from school as a result of holiday breaks. Please be sure to maintain high expectations in regard to student behavior. This includes interaction with their siblings and friends. Ensuring that conversations about behavior continue with your child will lead to an easier transition back to school and a culture of high standards for student behavior.

Response to Bullying

You can support us by making sure that your child doesn't bully others emotionally or physically, and also by ensuring that they don't stand by or be part of

bullying. Although this problem isn't unique to our district, we are addressing it with passion to ensure our students have a safe and healthy experience at school. Please contact your child's teacher or principal if you have any questions, and we will be happy to talk to you about ways you can address these issues with your child.

Morning Supervision:

As a reminder, Lowrey students are not to arrive to school until 7:45 a.m. They will be required to stand outside unless it is raining, snowing or below 20 degrees. Students should not arrive early, unless they are going to the cafeteria for breakfast. Parents are not permitted to walk down to the cafeteria with their children to breakfast. We want to help our students build independence.

Reading

Research has shown that reading is vital to the success of students in all subject areas; if students can't read, they can't begin to understand what they're reading in any subject. Not being able to read will inevitably hinder the student's performance at school. So how do we help our students with their literacy? One of the most effective and easy ways to ensure students are improving their reading is by exposing them to print constantly. This means that children need access to a variety of books that they can read whenever they want. Also, making sure that the books are interesting and at the student's reading level, will increase interest for reading. Increased reading will lead to improvement in skills over time. Let your children read to each other or their friends. Give them a library in their rooms or somewhere in the house where they have some books that they own and cherish. Involve your children with anything that gets them involved in reading for information that produces a result they're interested in (like buying a certain snack, or convincing you of getting them a certain game, etc...) These things I've mentioned, coupled with the Daily 5 and Café program we use with the students, will ensure that students are provided with what they need. We encourage you to have conversations with your children's teachers to make sure you have all your questions answered regarding what you can do to choose appropriate books for your children. Dearborn residents also have the benefit of free access to the Dearborn Public Libraries. This is a priceless resource that you can use with your children to spend quality time while addressing their school needs. The Henry Ford Centennial Library has many resources with a wonderful children's section designed for supporting students at home or at the library if they stay and read. From the Classrooms of:

Kindergarten Teachers:

So much is happening in our kindergarten classrooms. In Science we are learning about living and non-living things. We are writing about living and non-living things and what it means to be living and what we need to stay alive. In Social Studies, we are learning about where we are in the world. We will be learning to use a map and globe and how we describe locations and places. In Math we are continuing with addition up to 10 and now we will be learning to subtract numbers up to 10. We are also still working hard on composing and decomposing numbers up to 20. In ELA we will continue using Science and Social Studies informational texts to learn and then we will take the facts that we learn and write them down and be able to explain what we have learned. It is very important that we continue to discuss what we are learning and talk about it and then draw pictures and write about what we have learned. This helps us reinforce the concepts that we are learning about. Reading at school and at home is vital to our kindergarteners learning.

First Grade

Our first graders have been so busy with informational writing and poetry. We have been learning about the Earth and how it needs the sun for heat and light. Our first graders will be visiting the Ann Arbor Science Center on March 18th. We are so excited to use the scientific process to explore the many different aspects of science. Remember to read every night and ask your child questions after they read. What does this story make you think about? What lesson is the author trying to teach you? Can you retell the story?

Second Grade

March is here, and according to the groundhog it will be an early spring! Exciting things are happening in second grade. Students are generating informational animal reports, and getting ready for March is Reading month. We have our goals in place and students are ready for more reading across the curriculum. Weather it's learning about landforms, or generating story problems, students are showing great progress in moving forward toward their personal goals.

Our Dearborn Historical fieldtrip will start in March and continue for other classes throughout April. Students will learn about Dearborn's history and see firsthand how far we have come in present day. Churning butter, planting seeds, one room school house, and touring an old home is just a few of the amazing highlights on this trip.

Third Grade
