## Dear Parents,

**HAPPY HOLIDAYS:** We would like to wish everyone in our wonderful community a peaceful, warm, safe and blessed Thanksgiving. We hope that this Thanksgiving will be a happy one for all of our parents and their children.

**ATTENDANCE:** Please be sure to call the attendance office at 313-827-1800 if your child is going to be absent or late before 9:00 a.m. Please note if your child is late, you need to sign him back to school at the attendance office; students should not go straight to class. If parents are planning to check out their children from school, they must come to the office and office staff will call your children down. We ask that parents do not go straight to class and take out their children.

**MORNING SUPERVISION:** As a reminder, Lowrey students are not to arrive at school until 7:45 a.m. for middle school and elementary. Students should not arrive early unless they are going to the cafeteria for breakfast or going to morning tutoring.

**DISMISSAL TIME:** Lately, we noticed that many of our parents are starting to arrive to school before the designated release times (2:55 for Middle School, 3:00 for Elementary) to pick up their children. Furthermore, when elementary parents are in the hallway before the end of the school day, it becomes very difficult for the teachers to keep students focused. Students become distracted when they parents in the hallways. Teachers are instructed to wall all students outside at dismissal time. We would like all parents to wait either in their cars or outside their child's exit door.

Writing is the key that unlocks the alphabetic code. So, collaboratively the Kindergarten teachers' definition of excellence includes cooperative learning, rich experiences in the arts, science exploration, respectful and supportive parent connections, a language-intensive "writing-to-read" environment, systematic phonemic awareness through songs, and an explicit multisensory ABC and phonics immersion program within a comprehensive literacy framework. So please continue to work with your child on their new literacy work at home through reading their mini-books and reading to them each and every day!!!

- 5. Acknowledge the rights of others.


#### First Grade:

#### **Third grade:**

The importance of teaching vocabulary:

When expanding a student's vocabulary, be mindful of its importance. Vocabulary plays an important part in learning to read. For a student to really know a word, they must use it. It is important to give a student many opportunities to use and master a new vocabulary word. Additionally, understanding vocabulary words is imperative to reading comprehension. Readers must understand "vocabulary" words to know what they are reading. For students to master a words meaning, they should be exposed to the "new vocabulary word" often. Eventually, after hearing the "word(s)" multiple times, students will store the new vocabulary in their long-term memory. Here are a few tips to help teach vocabulary words:

- Read rigorously
- Align a picture to go hand and hand with the vocabulary word.
- Use the word often
- Teach students to actively engage with vocabulary: Highlighting, underlining, making notes, during writing and discussions etc.....
- Give students opportunity to use vocabulary words.
- Understand multiple meaning for the words (synonyms).
- Include new word(s) into class discussions and activities.



#### Fourth Grade:

November is a busy month for fourth graders! November 5th, we are going to the Ford Community & Performing Arts Center, to watch the Dearborn Symphony! Then, on November 11th, we are going to the Ann Arbor Hands on Museum for our science field trip! In writing, we will be working on informational pieces! Please remember to have your children read every day, go on Mobymax, and practice NWEA question and skills on the Dearborn Schools website. We are all excited for the beginning of the Holiday Season!!





#### Fifth Grade:

October was a busy month in fifth grade. In science the students built balloon-powered cars out of recycled materials. We had a lot of fun racing them across the finish line!
