Learning strategies





From the desk of the Kindergarten Teachers-Kindergarten is for Language

Development

It is familiarity with the English language that precedes and underlies excellent phonemic awareness instruction. It is this familiarity that allows a child's decoding to be error-free and their reading to be fluent. We must skillfully accelerate language learning – both thinking and oral communication – if we are to take a proactive approach to bridge the achievement gap and prevent later reading difficulties. That is why we encourage our children to hear grammatically correct English through their daily instruction and the literature they listen to.

As Kindergarten teachers, we must provide experiences that make language come alive, dramatically articulating and fluently modeling the sounds of language. We invite kindergartners to rehearse language as singers, signers, and storytellers. Lively discussion about quality fiction and nonfiction allows us to connect books with children's lives and provide the vehicle for explicit teaching of comprehension strategies.

We memorize, recite, and perform language. We differentiate instruction, honoring children's initial "magical memory reading" and skillfully transitioning them to guided and independent reading. We are conscious that listening comprehension comes before reading comprehension. Our curriculum invites children to communicate and interact. Developing the child's capacity for language and thought underlies everything we do in kindergarten. Please remember to read to your child (in whatever language you are native to) and continue to help our students become proficient in the English language!!!

<u>First Grade:</u>

Hello friends and family,

It's an exciting time of year for our friends! Our little first graders have been working extra hard on becoming better readers and writers. Please make sure that they are reading every night and parents that you are signing their reading logs. Also, make sure to practice their sight words daily. We are in the works to planning a field trip. When we gather more details we will send out more information about the trips to come. Look out for it! We hope you have a spectacular day, week, and month to come!

Second Grade:

November is here and so much has happened! Students are reading and writing in every subject area. We are assessing for report cards at the end of the semester. Students have made great growth and are very interested in learning new things daily! Make sure to schedule your conferences for November, and practice your NWEA skill test daily. We are looking forward to a great Thanksgiving and are very thankful for each other. Parents continue to read daily with your child and sign the reading logs. Once again thank you for all your support!

Third grade:

The third graders recently went on a field trip to the apple orchard. The students had a blast on the tractor ride. They were also able to pick out a pumpkin from the pumpkin patch. In addition to that we had some delicious doughnuts and cider. It was a trip to remember.

As far as curriculum goes, we have been working tirelessly in our classrooms. We began informational writing as well as non-fiction/ informational reading. We are tying in science with our writing by focusing on the different types of animals and their traits. In math we are working on different strategies to add and subtract three digit numbers up through 1,000. Also, we are honing in on how to use CUBES as a problem solving strategy. Students should be circling the numbers, Underling the question, Boxing key words, Eliminating details that are not important and Solving the equation. Lastly, we will be taking our social studies assessment this week and beginning our new unit on the history of Michigan. It is a pleasure to be developing these young minds into intelligent and independent learners.

Fourth Grade:

We have been very busy in fourth grade. In Math, we will be starting Unit 3 for the month of November. Students will focus on prime numbers, composite numbers, factors, comparing numbers, multiplication, and division. In Science, we are starting our unit on Physical Science. Students will investigate the properties of matter with an emphasis on mass and volume. In Social Studies, we will be focusing on Human Geography in the United States. How are people connected to the Earth and to each other? We will investigate stories of immigrants to the United States and describe the impact on culture and the physical environment. Also, we will begin informational writing. Students are working on writing 5 paragraphs using the informational hamburger. Please make sure your child is reading every night for at least 30 minutes. Also, some websites that they can work on at home are: www.khanacademy.com, www.mobymax.com, www.myon.com. The weather is changing and it is getting colder. Please make sure your child comes to school with a coat.

Fifth Grade:

October was a busy month in fifth grade. In science the students built balloon-powered cars out of recycled materials. We had a lot of fun racing them across the finish line! In social studies we are learning about Christopher Columbus and the early colonists. We encourage you to allow your students to get on their teacher's iBlog daily for links to great websites for practice with reading and math, like Frontrow.com. Our balloon cars and Native American projects are still on display in the basement. Please feel free to stop by and see the students' hard work! We look forward to parent-teacher-student conferences this month. Please bring your student with you to your conference time so we may continue working together as a team. We have much to share with you and it will benefit your child to hear about their progress.

Sixth Grade:

LANGUAGE ARTS:

We are currently working on one of the most interesting and fun units of the year, figurative language. Students will be exposed to many different types of figurative language and be able to apply their skills to numerous figurative language activities and projects. Students will be learning how to use evidence from the text they are reading to construct a short answer response. Many of our students have also began their reading logs or their close and critical reading assessments. 6th grade students should be reading for at least 15 to 20 minutes every night. Please continue to check your student's planner every night, and use the teacher's blogs and Remind messages to help keep you informed about the activities and events in class.

SCIENCE:

Things in our class are going great! We are currently working on environmental science. We are discussing many topics which include identifying interactions of living and nonliving things, ecosystems, food chains and food webs. We are also working on our written responses to explain our thinking, mostly focusing on how to write an extended response. We have been organizing the interactive notebook which includes everything we are learning and working on in class. Students have also been given a text book to use as a resource for learning. They are responding very well to learning more about science.

SOCIAL STUDIES:

We are getting into Government this week where we will study the purpose of a government, compare the different types of governments and their economic systems. Students will also be making a country of their own as they create an island nation, where they are the government and law makers.

It's Election Season! In some classes, we held mock US elections. Students were also invited to vote for the US president on Scholastic.com/vote. This is super exciting because the students are able to choose who they want to be president of the United States! Elections for class representatives for Lowrey Student Council were also conducted. Students wrote speeches and their classmates got to vote. Now, each Social Studies class has a representative and alternate to representative in the 6th grade at Student Council meetings and events.



6th Graders have made such an impressive transition thus far. As we continue to implement organization, responsibility, and respect, our students continue to be responsive. Positive attitudes and smiling faces have made it almost effortless to make connections and bonding easy with these exceptional 6th graders.

This month we are wrapping up our work with area of polygons and the coordinate plane in our geometry unit. Students have been practicing plotting points on the coordinate plane and finding the areas of complex figures using composing and decomposing. Our next geometry unit will be calculating surface area and volume of 3-dimensional figures. In our number systems unit, we continue to focus on operations with fractions and mixed numbers. By this point, students should be able to fluently add and subtract mixed numbers. We will continue to practice multiplying mixed numbers. Once we finish multiplying, we will move into dividing fractions and mixed numbers. Students should continue to practice the skills we are working on in class on Khan Academy. In addition, students should brush up on their basic skills from previous years.

Here's What's Happening! 7th Grade

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^{7th} grade science is working on developing an understanding that all matter has observable attributes with physical and chemical properties that are described, measured, and compared. Understand that states of matter exist as solid, liquid, or gas; and have physical and chemical properties. Understand all matter is composed of combinations of elements, which are organized by common attributes and characteristics on the Periodic Table. Understand that substances can be classified as mixtures or compounds and according to their physical and chemical properties.



Students in 7th grade Math finished up the Number Systems Unit and began working on Equations/Expressions and Ratios/Proportions. Stay updated on all assignments

through the classroom blog. Students are expected to do 60 minutes of Khan Academy every week. Please make sure to continue checking your child's planner daily.



Students in 7th grade Language Arts are working on strengthening their reading and comprehension skills. Students should be reading four times a week, for a minimum of twenty minutes. Students are also required to answer a short prompt to check for understanding. Seventh graders will also be working on mastering the application of their most common literary terms, as well as being able to create the pyramid of action using a narrative text.



7th grade Social Studies students are learning how the ancient civilizations thrived. They have taken part in QAR to figure out how ancient civilizations were able to make their own food supply and change from hunters and gatherers to farmers. They have learned that humans have domesticated animals, began to live in

communities and we will soon see the development of the first ancient cities.

Eighth-grade English Language Arts:

Over the last month, students have been writing and revising argumentative essays on the topic of whether the United States should continue minting pennies. The state frequently tests students in this form of writing.

Additionally, students are preparing guides to identify the parts of speech in magazines. Once the eight parts of speech have been identified, students will tabulate the number of each part of speech and transpose their results into a pie graph. This lesson is designed to give students a practical knowledge of the parts of speech so that, for example, they can judge whether they are writing complete sentences.

Additionally, students have completed reading the play "The Hitchhiker," in which the focus is on foreshadowing.

For detailed instructions on doing homework and class assignments, students have the teacher's blog to refer to. The textbook, <u>Literature</u>, can also be accessed on line at my.hrw.com.

<u>Math</u>

8th grade Pre-Algebra is working on Linear Functions and Angle Relation. Algebra is working on Linear Function Essential and Solving Equations (work problems). The Basic Skill this marking period will be adding and subtracting integers. All 8th grade students must do a minimum of 40 minutes per week on Khan Academy. Students have 10-30 minutes of math home a day.
