Dear Parents, The Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress (M-STEP)

testing window this school year is April 9- 30 for 5th and 8th Graders, and April 30-May 21, 2018 for 4th and 6th-7th graders. Students in grades 4-8th will take the English Language Arts and the Mathematics assessments, which will include both open-ended response and multiple choice questions. The science and social studies tests will be given to 5th & 8th graders. The Science and Social Studies assessments will only include multiple

questions. Please review with your child the following test-taking tips.

Before the Test:

- Develop a positive attitude.
 Tell yourself, "I will do my best on this test."
- Get a good night's sleep the night before the test.
- Get up early enough to avoid hurrying to get ready for school.
- Eat a healthy breakfast.

During the Test:

- Relax and stay calm.
- Listen carefully to the directions the teacher gives.

- Ask questions if you don't understand what to do.
- Read each question carefully. Find the key words. Try to figure out what the question is really asking.
- Read the entire question and look at all the answer choices.
- Use strategies you learned in class to figure out the answer
- Take your time picking the best answer.
- Go back and recheck your answers

National Walk Out Day


