Overturn every pillow and couch cushion to help your child find loose change.

Remember they can collect dollars, checks and change, so encourage them to bring their collection box or envelope everywhere they go!

Make sure they bring in their collection box or envelope many times so they can help fill up their classroom boxes.

By collecting donations, LLS is able to fund more effective therapies. In the 1960's the survival rate for the most common form of childhood leukemia was 3%. Today it's approximately 90% thanks to many research advances funded by programs like Student Series.


#### CELEBRATE:
